

As of January 2020, CCR of Adoption Connecticut has awarded **\$401,500** in adoption assistance grants across Connecticut to complete the adoptions of **26 children**.



Chapter Goal

Each year 10% of adoptions Connecticut awards requests from approximately 100 qualified families – representing a funding pool of \$400,000. The goal of the Connecticut Chapter is to ensure families in need throughout the state complete each of these adoptions. 100% of the money award by the Chapter is directed to working families with foster families in the state.



Mission

CCR of Adoption provides a national family placement facilitation service grant to complete the adoption of vulnerable children – young, African American, female, and the chronically ill.



Priority

Priority is placed on helping children facing serious physical, but only chronic, at adoption, including children with or separation from siblings or siblings with special needs, coping with an orphanage or with critical medical conditions. Our grants are given without regard to race or ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation or marital status and are paid directly to agencies and adoptive families in the child's best interest.

Eligibility

Only U.S. states adopting their children in the world (domestic or international) who has an approved home study in place is eligible. Financial need must be demonstrated.



History

CCR of Adoption was founded in 1990 by adoption parents Gene and Joyce White of Groton, Connecticut. Due to overwhelming demand for adoption assistance grants, the White couple transferred the organization's ownership to a public charity in 2016.

National Impact

Since inception, CCR has awarded their efforts to complete the adoptions of 1,000 children. Because our model relies on many public efforts to take at-risk and being participants in a healthy, well-being in the life of a child's best interest.
