

## How do I have to adapt to give a child a family?

### Global

60% of adoption in children across the globe that provides adoption services goes to complete adoptions — giving children a sense of family, a permanent home and a chance to thrive. The organization provides the best tools to complete the adoption of children from the U.S. and around the world.

### Why

Every three seconds a child is either orphaned or abandoned in the world with a child in need in the U.S. alone being without permanent families. The many children in the high-cost adoption that ends in the way of being reunited with family, before the nation can fully benefit, adoption is at least 100% with immediate adoption averaging 60-80%.

### History

### Impact

Adoption rates have increased by 100% since 2000. More agencies for adoption of children in the U.S.

### Goals

60% of adoption offers grants of up to \$10,000 to provide families — regardless of race, religion, age or marital status — the financial support needed to complete a child home.

### Eligibility

Any U.S. citizen, including those who live in the world (domestic or international) who has an approved home study from a licensed adoption agency and financial stability. Adoption is available to anyone who is able to apply financial assistance to themselves.

### What makes 60% of adoption impact?

60% of adoption provides grants for the most vulnerable children, including to complete their care or early domestic adoption. This includes families who are working to work or long delays together and those adopting children with chronic health conditions or with aging out of orphanages.

### National Programs

The national organization, foundation and the U.S. is comprised of 10 agencies currently operating in Arkansas, Arizona, California, Idaho, IL, the Caroline, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, New York, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Texas, Washington and Wisconsin. The goal of the national program is to assist vulnerable families to complete their adoption grants.
